A VERY SPECIAL VISIT

Servol was privileged in 2023, to welcome two old friends and Servol workers from the 70's. Fondly known as "*Bumper*" and "*Corps*", Leading Seaman David Grant (Bumper) and Corporal Reynold Henry (Corps) happened to be in Trinidad at the same time and visited our Administration Building in Oxford Street, Port of Spain. These gentlemen were two of the early Servol workers back in the day.

"Bumper" was one of the sailors who were among the 12 Army and Coast Guard personnel assigned to work with Fr. Gerry in 1970. While others were given work among the communities in East Dry River, Beetham and Sealots, Bumper was assigned to work with the Community in St. Barb's, Laventille and worked along-side Dr. Michael Camps and Nurse Marilyn Stollmeyer in the Servol Clinic on the top of the hill. He organized the visits and supplies for the clinic. He was always there to welcome the medical staff and chat with the patients, who appreciated his jovial and happy personality and his willingness to help far beyond the call of duty.

"Corps" came on the scene when, in 1975, Servol's first Women's Training Programme was established in Laventille Road, where the Moravian Church Hall was shared with the Servol Special School in those days. When the children left at 3:00 pm, the young women arrived to begin their course from 4:00 to 6:00 pm, Monday to Friday. Being an experienced Chef, Corps came on board in his free time twice a week to work with the young women.

There was no state-of-the-art kitchen like we now have in Servol: a small stove with an oven, an old table, and a few donated pots and pans were all we could afford. In those days, funds were none existent, so everything that was made had to be sold.

So cakes, pastries, bread and party snacks were the main produce. Learning to do this, they began in small ways to produce items at home to sell in their communities, giving them some income. Corps was very proud of his students as they were also trained to work in hotels and restaurants and were able to get jobs. Corps was always a pleasure to work alongside. He was happy but serious about his work and always went the extra mile to ensure his students were on-top of their game.

These two foundation members of Servol will always be remembered with affection and gratitude for their many years of service in what was at the time a very 'New Programme'. Their contribution set the tone and the path for what Servol has become today. With some 200 Centres spread across Trinidad and Tobago Servol offers over twenty (20) Skill Training Programmes in Geriatric Nursing, Catering and Hospitality as well as, in Construction Skills and Auto-mechanics, Hi-Tech courses and Computer Programmes.

Servol administers Day Care Centres, Early Childhood and Junior Life Centres as well as two Special Schools for differently-abled children. With a staff of some 500 persons at all levels, Servol continues to quietly serve the people of Trinidad and Tobago.

Thanks to those who came in the early days, with some help from the Government and local fund raising, the organization has grown and developed over the years.

We continue to be grateful to "Bumper" and "Corps" to all our staff, and to all those from the business and local community who continue to give their support and help.

It was not easy to capture the attention of 15- to 16-year-olds especially when we had to dig 'nests' to plant our 'baby' root crops, but slowly with 'growing' enthusiasm, their love of planting bloomed.

They were amazed after returning from their Christmas break to see the different range of flowers, taller ornamental plants and fruit trees, pumpkin, and sweet potato vines etc., that they planted along with a wide variety of butterflies, bees and other insects.



Aside from the garden planting We do a mix-tasting of various fruits, introduce them to various animals to hold and talk about, survival techniques eg de-husking a coconut without tools, stretching and breathing exercises, drawing, games, helping them to build positive relationships.
