50th Anniversary of SERVOL Special School

ndeed, it was the discernment of one brave woman named Margaret Adams- Roberts who dared to look upon the children who were *differently-able* without flinching; consequently, on September 3rd, 1972, *SERVOL SPECIAL SCHOOL, located at Duncan Street,* welcomed its first set of students, fourteen (14) mentally challenged and fourteen (14) hearing impaired. The school remained at Duncan



Street for four and a half years; in 1977, it was relocated to the MORAVIAN HALL on Laventille Road.

On December 10th, 1978, *SERVOL SPECIAL SCHOOL found a home on Calvary Hill, the former Calvary Roman Catholic School compound. SERVOL SPECIAL SCHOOL was called SUNSHINE HILL LIFE CENTRE.* Sunshine Hill Life Centre opened its doors with sixty (60) students and three (3) teachers. In 2000, I joined Sunshine Hill staff on their journey when the school was 28 years old. There I met a team of vibrant, creative people such as Ms. Drayton, Pierre, Richards, Julien, Alexander, Winchester, Courtney, Thomas Roberts and Mr. Percival. Then Ms. Charles and Ms. Brewster came we became the school's core. The staff created an energy that motivated all who came into place. Teachers were always challenging each other; there was never a challenge that they did not rise to, whether it be preparing the students for Special Olympics, School Sports Day, Power Gen or taking them out to sing at a special event, or School Open Day. 'Open Day' was used to bring out the competitive behaviour of the staff. Every teacher wanted to *"WOW THE PARENTS AND EACH OTHER."* They went out to decorate their class and display their students' crafts. Nothing was too hard for this group, and it was exciting to be part of it. Parents supported our events, whatever the occasion, our parents were always there.

Even though teachers gave their best to their students, not all had been to university, so when GATE was opened to society, teachers ran through that gate with such a speed that **Seven (7) of them Graduated from CREDI in 2012**, including Mrs. Roberts, who was the principal at that time. I saw Sunshine Hill as the flagship for special education in society. I was very excited to have these trained teachers at school. *If these teachers were giving their best without training, how much more will they give now that they are qualified?* It turned out to be just a dream, a figment of my imagination. Instead, teachers left because salaries did not change, and the environment was changing.

Over the years, as teachers were moving on, coming and leaving, the community at Calvary Hill where the Special school is located, was changing. It was now known as a "HIGH-RISK" area, with "shots ringing out" every day. Unfortunately for us, replacing teachers became a serious challenge since no one wanted to come to Calvary Hill. Nevertheless, Digicel still sent Therapists to train us in Speech and Language Therapy, Occupational Therapy and Therapy for Autism.

From 2014-2019, Sunshine Hill was compared to *CITY GATE*, where teachers came, stayed a little while, and then left. This was replayed for five years. Meanwhile, the remaining teachers were becoming discouraged, tired and frustrated, for each one felt like a single parent raising seventy (70) children. *(Continued on Page 4)*

Those were depressing and emotionally draining days for the few staff. Students also suffered from the malaise that enveloped the school. Some students dropped out, some parents removed their children because they were too scared to visit the school, and some complained about the quality of the violence; *They refused to come up the hill!* Once some professionals from the Community Police, Hearts and Mind Division came to visit and told us that we were traumatized from working in such a volatile environment.

However, from 2019-2022, a window was flung open and bright beams of light and fresh air was pumped into Sunshine Hill. We got teachers willing to stay who enjoy working with the children and shared the work of educating Seventy (70) students. The community has not changed much, we still have to deal with the shooting and crime, and teachers are still traumatized.

Today we have seventy students (70) and a staff of eleven (11). Our vision is to educate each child in a manner that will prepare him/her for life. To fulfil this vision, we provide a curriculum that prepares the child for life in society;

Self-help skills, reading, art and craft, math, community awareness, computer literacy, language arts, life skills, health education, home economics, science, social studies, pre-vocational, and organized games. Our extracurricular activities include drumming, singing, field trips, powerlifting for Special Olympics, sewing and pan.

With the advent of COVID-19, 90% of our students worked online, which helped them improve their computer skills. Today, 90% of our students are more computer literate. Thanks to Digicel, who donated Seventy-five (75) tablets to the school, which made it possible for all our students to be online.

Over the years, our students have made us proud through their contributions to society as masons, hairdressers, nail techs, seamstresses, chefs, welders, carnival band designers and Olympic gold medalists. For fifty (50) years, we have helped our students develop drive, strength, self-management, and high self-esteem, all of which work together to help them fulfil their life goals.
